- Diversity: Gender, SES, Family's location, Ethnic background

- Size and Location
- Cost/Financial Aid (EFC)
 - CUNY - \$6,330 (tuition)
 - SUNY – \$20,130 (approx. \$6,470 tuition + \$13,660 fees, room & board)
 - NYU - \$65,330 (approx. \$47,750 tuition + \$17,580 room & board)

Transcripts and Test Scores

SAT (I) Reasoning

- Three sections include: Critical Reading, Math, and Writing
- Scores in Critical Reading and Math need to equal 1200 for competitive colleges, 1400 for highly competitive colleges
- Seniors can/should retake the SATs in October, November or December of 2015
- Prep courses and review books are highly recommended (Kaplan, Revolution Prep, Princeton, private tutors + Shmoop!)
- Fee waivers are available for those who qualify

Transcripts and Test Scores

SAT (II) Subject Tests

- Subject Tests (includes Literature, History, Math, Sciences, Foreign Languages)
- 2-3 are usually required for more competitive schools
- Correlate with field of study (Engineering majors need math and physics)
- Students can take up to 3 SAT Subject tests on same date – 1 hour each
- Students cannot take both SAT Reasoning and SAT Subject tests on the same day
- Registration deadline is approximately 1 month before test date
- Score choice provides students with the ability to pick and choose which scores to submit to their colleges when the time comes

Transcripts and Test Scores

ACT with Writing

- Five sections include: English, Math, Reading, Science and Writing (optional)
- Composite score needs to equal 26 for competitive colleges, 31 for highly competitive colleges
- Seniors can/should retake the ACTs in October, or December of 2015
- Prep courses and review books are highly recommended (Kaplan, Revolution Prep, Princeton, private tutors + Shmoop!)
- Fee waivers are available for those who qualify

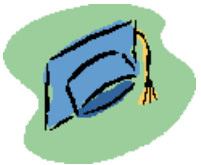

- SAT Subject - \$26 to register \$18 for each subject test (\$26 for Language with Listening)
(Late fees \$28; Standby/Waitlist \$46)
- ACT (Plus Writing) - \$56.50
- Cost of sending scores to schools - \$11.25 (SAT) \$12 (ACT) (4 free with each reg.)
- Applications \$40 - \$90 per school
- Application Fee waivers
- FAFSA (no cost)/CSS Profile - \$25 registration fee; \$16 for each school

Teacher's Recommendation



- Letter of recommendation and/or summary sheet
- Teachers should be selected based on subject(s) taught and academic performance



Most of the Notre Dame faculty submit their recommendations electronically, however, if the teacher will not be completing the recommendation online, students must provide an addressed and stamped business envelope for each recommendation request and allow at 3 weeks for completion

Counselor Recommendation



- Letter of recommendation
- Secondary school report
- Official Transcript
- School Profile
- Midyear Report (January)



If the counselor is unable to upload the necessary documents online, students must then provide an addressed and stamped 6x9 envelope for each request and allow at least 3 weeks for completion
